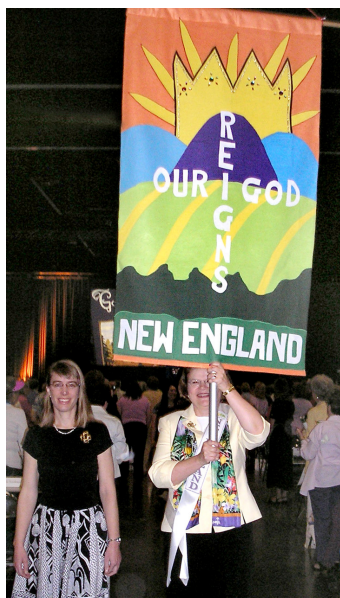

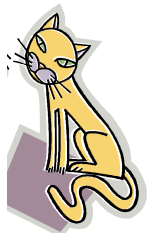
Snapshot #3 Closing Comments

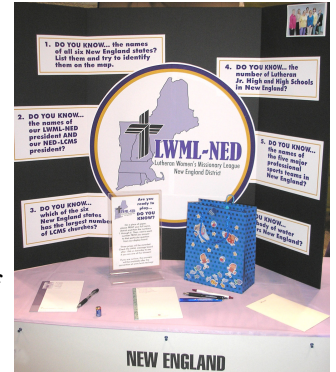

\$1,825,000!

Yes, that is the new 2009-2011 LWML Mission Goal voted upon at the Convention in Portland! I was amazed that the goal was again raised—\$125,000 over last biennium; however, with the Lord's help we will "Look to the Hills" and reach that goal! "God Reigns."

Initially, of 83 proposals submitted to the LWML Board for consideration; 28 were on the ballot. How can one choose? They are all so worthy! I was pleased to see that the delegates chose "Human Care & Pastoral Ministries Developed in Latvia & Lithuania" for \$87,500. Family friends from those two countries have shared stories emphasizing the need for continued mission outreach in that area of the world. Praise the Lord! The first mission grant, "Defray Costs of Shipping Quilts by Lutheran World Relief," for \$80,000 has already been funded since two offerings at the convention were designated toward the new mission goal.



A very moving moment came when the 2009-2011 Mission Grants were announced and everyone stood and spontaneously joined in singing: Praise God, from whom all blessings flow!

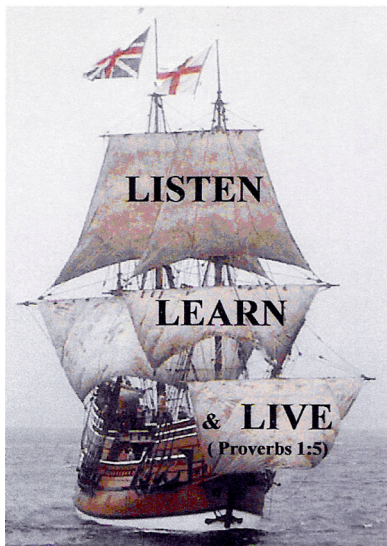

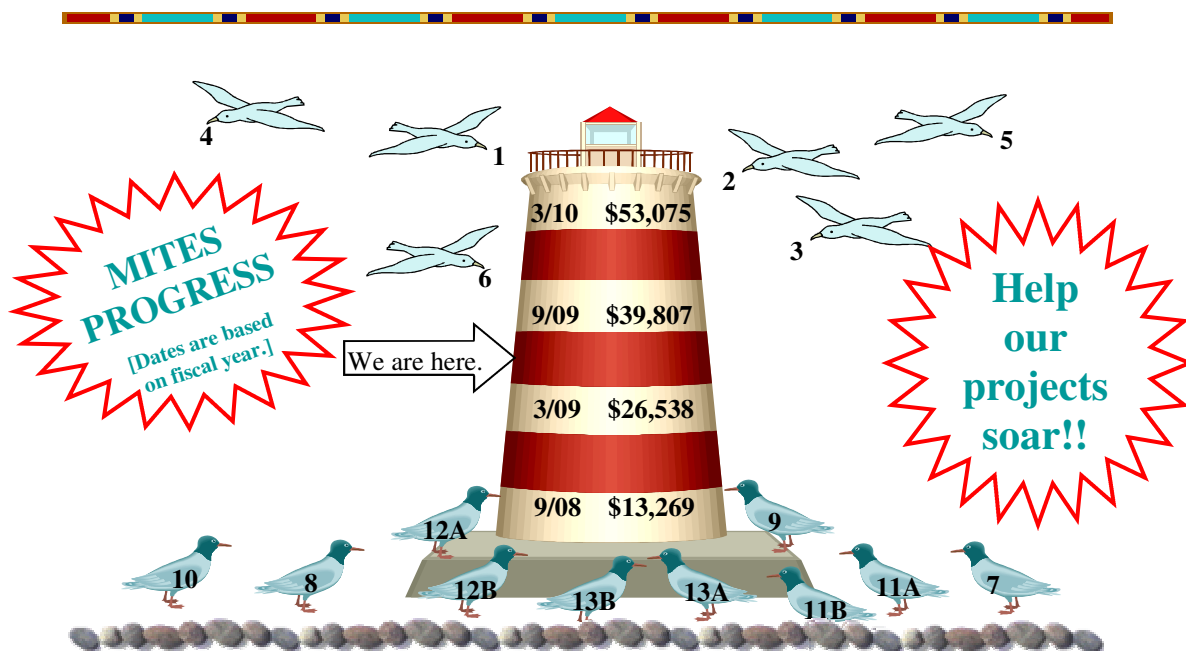
Please pray for each of our students as they begin their new academic year.
