- I see LWML-NED board members at work daily.




Hands of LWML NED Board members


Priscilla and I will be looking for nominees to fill the following positions in 2014 and are open to suggestions:




**Remembering “COME”,



Diapers abound! Your generosity resulted in our B-A-B-Y blocks overflowing with diapers for Birthright. Janet Greenwood, Birthright's representative, wrote to express her appreciation: "How can we adequately thank you and the Lutheran Women's Missionary League for such incredible generosity? I estimated that you provided 54 boxes of an average count of 234 diapers, or 12,000 diapers! With an average value of \$50 per box, that would be equivalent to \$2,700, a tremendous gift to our mothers. Due to the volume of diapers, we decided to "share the wealth" with our sister organizations. [Malta House, Birthright of Norwalk and Danbury] I wanted to make sure the diapers were put to their intended purpose in a relatively short time, and did not want to "hoard" them. Thank you again for thinking of us, and for the generosity of your organization."



Other News

Former LWML NED President Lynn Batchelder brought greetings to the NED LCMS in June; and after she spoke, NED LCMS President James Keurulainen encouraged delegates and guests to support the work of the LWML women and to consider placing a donation in a large Mite Box he held up. There was \$71 in the box at the end of the convention which went to our Mission Goal. As of August 8 we have raised \$6418.05 toward our goal of \$55,000.

Mid-Valley Zone

The women of the Mid-Valley Zone gathered at Zion in Manchester, CT to hear Rev. Paul Lantz and his wife, Rosangela, speak about their mission to Brazilians and college students living in the Boston area as missionary-at-large at First Lutheran in Boston. Approximately forty people are currently meeting twice a month at First Lutheran; and in the last year, there have been two baptisms, one confirmation, one marriage, and weekly Sunday School.

They also hold holiday parties with the English-speaking congregation at First Lutheran, organize leadership training and conduct an Emmaus Walk offsite. They continue to try to have their Brazilian group interact with the congregation at First Lutheran.

Their work with the college students uses Boston Campus Connections to reach out to campus students. Starting with four students at First Lutheran Church, they try to get the students involved with the activities at the church. Pastor Paul hosts a weekly dinner and devotion.

Following closing prayer, the gathering ended with a dinner prepared by the women of Zion's LWML.

Northern Zone

With "The Great Commission" as the theme, the Northern Zone held their spring gathering at Redeemer in Gorham, ME. Pastor Balfour led a challenging Bible study, "Go where?", encouraging us to further God's kingdom by our witness and example wherever our daily activities may place us.

Gifts from the Heart were toiletries, gift cards and jewelry for the women refugees who gather weekly at The Root Cellar in Portland, ME. After lunch, the ladies made several soft dolls from children's stockings with a loving message attached to be given to the young children at the Root Cellar.

Listed below are the items that are requested from the **New England District**. We will be collecting these Love Gifts at the retreat on October 26th and 27th.


- ♥ 82 pieces of fleece (50" x 60" or 48" x 48") solid color or print ready to be tied

- ♥ 62 spiral notebooks (8 1/2 x 11)
- ♥ assorted tea bags (need at least 500)
- ♥ 20 packets of card stock (8 1/2 x 11) assorted colors, pack of 50



Monetary gifts will also be accepted. All items gathered will need to be shipped to Pittsburgh to be stored in the convention warehouse space by February 1, 2013.
